OUR SPECTRUM

Amardeep Singh Shergill Memorial College, Mukandpur (SBS Nagar) was taken over by Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar on July 4th, 2007 as a University College with the mission to provide quality education to the rural youth. The university has established this institution as Rural Model College. Under the aegis of worthy Vice - Chancellor, Prof. (Dr.) Karamjeet Singh, our college is progressing by leaps and bounds. The college was established in 1994 in the memory of Amardeep Singh Shergill, an illustrious student of London School of Economics who passed away in the prime of his youth. He was the only son of S. Gurcharan Singh Shergill and Sardarni Surinder Kaur Shergill. Instead of getting subdued in grief, the parents decided to serve a noble cause of spreading the light of knowledge amongst rural youth with the help of other 120 NRI associates.

The college is situated at Mukandpur, a small town in district S.B.S. Nagar. It is about 8 Kms from Banga, 20 Kms from Phagwara, 20 Kms from Phillaur and 20Kms from SBS Nagar. The campus sprawls in an area of over 20 acres with an architecture that merges with the landscape. It has a splendid triple-storeyed building with an open shelf library, having more than 33,543 books, 40 journals/magazines and leading newspapers. The college library is also providing e-journals and e-books through NLIST, Directory of Open Access Journals (DOAJ) and National Digital Library of India. The library has a separate e-book section also. Students can also access educational C.D's in the library. The college library provides facility of internet and photocopy to students and faculty members. The college has Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Home Science, Music (V) labs and smart class rooms. In addition to this, there is a separate Computer Science and I.T. Block, which has six state-of-the-art Computer Labs equipped with 150 computers and internet connectivity of 20mbps (1:1) through radio link. Equipped with modern teaching aids, the Department of Commerce and Business Management disseminates essential skills of entrepreneurship through academic and professional courses. There is a separate Seminar hall with a seating capacity of 170 persons. A hostel for 80 girls is available with extended internet facility in it.

The Gymnasium with its latest imported machines is a cynosure of all eyes. Sports facilities include a track of four hundred meters and playfields for football, hockey, volleyball and handball. A fleet of buses carries the girl students to college and back to their homes. The beautiful open-air theatre helps our students to nurture their academic and cultural capabilities.

The college has highly qualified, hardworking and dedicated faculty. Presently, the college is running professional programmes like MCA(TYP), MBA(TYP), MBA(FYIP), PGDCA, PGDTDSM & RF, CCA, CNCN, CMLT, along with other traditional programmes like M.Com., MA(Punjabi), M.Sc.(I.T), BA (Honours), B.Sc. (Honours), B.Com. (Honours), BCA (Honours) The college has implemented NEP 2020 as per directions of Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar.

To widen the horizons of the learning, seminars and extension lectures by eminent speakers are arranged in the college from time to time. Separate units of N.S.S., Youth Club and faculty/subject wise societies have been working to make our students disciplined and service-oriented citizens. Under the buddy group programme for drug awareness being run by the Punjab Government, we are working towards educating our students about the ill effects of drug abuse and generate positive peer influence. Our college is leading in academics in the area and also has achieved name and fame in cultural activities. Educational trips are also organised during the session. Apart from being a medium for entertainment, these educational trips cultivate team spirit, mutual adjustment and tolerance amongst the youth. Various cultural programmes including talent hunt, inter-college competitions and Amardeep Mela are organized annually. Athletic meet is also our annual feature. College Gurudwara instill the good character and mental strength that students require to be successful at work and have a good life.

- It is necessary for students to update their Aadhar card after age of 15. Aadhar number must be linked with mobile number.
- To avail any kind of financial benefits, Aadhar card of concerned student must be seeded with the bank account.
- Every student should have individual operational bank account in any nationalized bank.
- Documents related to S.C./S.T./B.C./Physically Handicapped/Minority (if applicable). For the format of these documents, contact concerned head.
- Every student should have Digi Locker App in his/her mobile.
- Every student should have a unique APAAR ID for credit accumulation.
- Students from foreign universities need equivalency certificate from G.N.D.U., Amritsar and prescribed student visa from Indian Government.
- If the student has passed the lower examination from any Board/ University other than / Punjab School Education Board/ Punjab University/Punjabi University/Guru Nanak Dev University, he/she has to produce migration certificate from the concerned Board/University, to the college up to one month from admission for getting eligibility certificate from G.N.D.U., Amritsar, failing which the student will be penalized Rs. 500/- and thereafter his/her candidature will be cancelled.

Rules and Instructions Regarding Admission

- The application for admission will be accepted only in the prescribed admission form available in the college office .
- The form should be filled in by the student himself /herself in legible writing.
- Incomplete application will not be accepted for admission.
- The student having compartment in 10+2 examination will be allowed to appear provisionally in the 1st semester or Bachelor level of Course being offered in College subject to the conditions that it will be mandatory for him/her to pass +2 compartment till 31 January(of the first year), otherwise the admission will be cancelled*.
- The student with compartment in graduation cannot be admitted in higher courses. If a student clears compartment within late fee dates then he/she can be admitted with late fee. Date of declaration of result will be considered valid not the date of issue of detail marks card.
- Failed students from other institutions will not ordinarily be entertained in any programme.
- For SC/ST students, relaxation of 5% marks in eligibility conditions shall be given as per rules

- Student who has passed 10+2 from National Open School, New Delhi, and Punjab School Education Board Open School may be given admission in semester 1 of Under Graduation/ Certificate courses only on provisional basis. He/ She will have to get equivalency certificate from GNDU.
- The student, whose result is declared late by the Board / University, can get admission within ten days (from date of declaration of result) without any late fee.
- The College has right to correct the combination if a student chooses or is allotted a wrong subject combination by mistake.
- The age limit for students seeking admission in 1st semester of B.A.(Honours) / B.C.A.(Honours) / B.Sc.(Honours) / B.Com.(Honours) / M.B.A.(FYIP) / C.C.A./ C.N.C.N./ C.M. L.T. will be 20 years.
- In the absence of any rules by Board/University/Institution, the Principal has full decisive powers.
- Student must have good moral character

Important Note

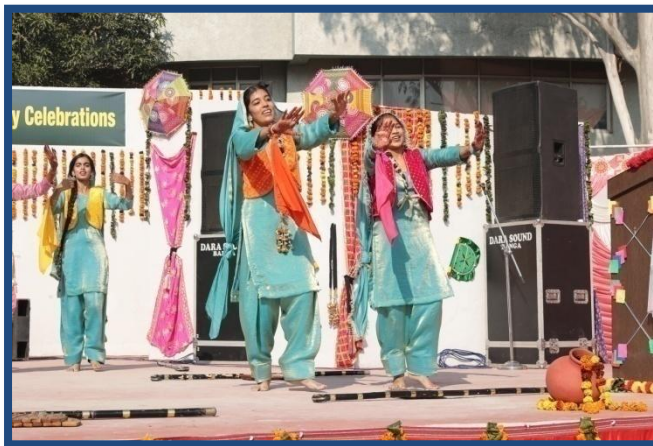
- If any student overlooks above-mentioned instructions and tries to seek admission by giving false statement/document, then he/she will himself/herself be responsible for cancellation of his/her admission and forfeiture of his/her fee/funds.
- If number of admitted students in a class falls short of the minimum requirement of twenty students set by the university, the admission made to that class shall be cancelled and the fee etc. deposited shall be refunded to the student in due course under university rules.
- The Principal has the discretion to permit or deny admission in any subject/subject combination/option/course in the college to any student.

Rules Regarding Change of Subject/Programme

- A student can change subject/subjects within 15 days from the commencement of classes by filling prescribed proforma available in the office.
- Lectures in the subject would be counted from the start of the class, not from the date of changing the subject.
- A change in subject/ course/faculty must be intimated to the college office immediately.
- A student seeking change of course/ faculty will have to pay Rs. 1000.
- A student cannot change subject/ course/faculty without approval of concerned Head /In-charge and Principal.



Reservation Policy

Reservation of seats in a program shall be determined as per the Reservation Policy of the state of Punjab adopted by the University.

- (i) Applications under a reserved category must be accompanied by a certificate from the competent authority (as given in Reservation Policy) stating that the candidate belongs to that particular reserved category for which he/she is claiming a seat.
- (ii) All candidates must declare their claims for reserved categories at the time of filling their application form.
- (iii) All admissions made in the reserved categories will be provisional and liable to cancellation if at any stage, any information about reserved categories furnished by the candidate is found to be fabricated or false.

University Ordinance of Carry on System for Various Semester Examination

I. Programmes having two semester duration:

- a. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from first semester to second semester.
- b. In case a student fails to pass all the courses/papers within a period of two semesters (One Year), he/she shall be given two consecutive semesters (One Year) more to pass.

II. Programmes having four semester duration:

- a. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from first semester to second semester provided that he/she fulfills all requirements under the prevailing ordinances and has been issued Roll number for first semester examination.
- b. However, the student shall be promoted to the third semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/papers of the first two semesters.
- c. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from third semester to fourth semester.
- d. In case a student fails to pass all the courses/papers within a period of four semesters (Two Years), he/she shall be given four consecutive semesters (Two Years) more to pass.

III. Programmes having six semester duration:

- a. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from first semester to second semester.
- b. However, the student shall be promoted to the third semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/papers of the first two semesters.
- c. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from third semester to fourth semester.
- d. However, a student shall be promoted to fifth semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/ papers of the first four semesters.
- e. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from fifth semester to sixth semester. After a period of six semesters the student shall be given a period of two consecutive years to pass.

IV. Courses having eight semester duration:-

- a. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from first semester to second semester.
- b. A student shall be promoted to the third semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/papers of the first two semesters, but there will be no condition for promoting a student from third semester to four semester.
- c. A student shall be promoted to fifth semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/ papers of the first four semesters.
- d. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from fifth semester to sixth semester.
- e. A student shall be promoted to seventh semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/ papers of the first six semesters.
- f. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from seventh semester to eight semester and after a period of eight semester, the student shall be given a period of two consecutive years to pass.

V. Programmes having ten semester duration:

- a. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from first semester to second semester provided that he/she fulfills all requirements under the prevailing ordinances and has been issued Roll number for first semester examination.
- b. A student shall be promoted to the third semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/papers of the first two semesters, but there will be no condition for promoting a student from third semester to fourth semester.
- c. A student shall be promoted to fifth semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/papers of the first four semesters.
- d. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from fifth semester to sixth semester.
- e. A student shall be promoted to seventh semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/ papers of the first six semesters.
- f. There will be no condition for promoting the student from seventh semester to eighth semester.
- g. However, a student shall be promoted to ninth semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/papers of the first eight semesters.
- h. There will be no condition for promoting the student from ninth semester to tenth semester.
- i. After a period of ten semesters, the student will be given a period of two consecutive years more to pass.

4-Year UG Honours Degree Programmes under NEP 2020

The Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar has introduced 4-year under graduate Honours Degree Programmes as per NEP 2020 from the academic year 2024-25. The curriculum framework for 4-year UG Degree Programmes has the following features:

1. Discipline Specific Courses: Discipline Specific Courses (DSC) are designed to provide in depth knowledge and skills pertinent to a particular field or profession.

- Each student is required to select and successfully complete three DSCS as part of first 3 years of their undergraduate degree program. In the 4th year of undergraduate honours degree programme, students have the option to choose any one of the Discipline Specific Courses (DSC) that they have studied during the first three years of their undergraduate degree programme.

2. Ability Enhancement Courses: Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) are designed to develop essential skills and competencies that complement the students' major field of study, enhancing their overall educational experience and employability.

- Each student is required to successfully complete at least one AEC every year during first three years of undergraduate degree program.

3. Multidisciplinary Courses: Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC) are designed to integrate knowledge and methodologies from multiple disciplines.

- Each student is required to select and successfully complete at least one MDC every year during first 3 years of undergraduate degree program.

4. Skill Enhancement Courses: Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) are designed to develop specific skills that are valuable for personal growth, academic excellence, and carrier readiness. Each student is required to select and successfully complete at least one SEC every year during first 3 years undergraduate degree program.

- Mandatory skill enhancement course "Entrepreneurship Mindset" (2 Credits) is incorporated in all the UG/FYIP degrees in Semester I-V w.e.f. Batch 2026 onwards *.
- The Course Sikh Religion: Basic Information (2 Credits) is introduced in UG Programmes which will be taught by the ODL and online studies department**.

5. Value Added Courses: Value Added Courses (VAC) are designed to provide students with specialized knowledge and understanding in critical areas that are relevant to societal and environmental challenges.

- Value added courses viz Drug Abuse: problem management and prevention, Environmental Studies, and Human Rights & Constitutional Duties are mandatory qualifying courses for a student of an undergraduate degree program. Student is required to successfully complete all the three VACs during first 3 years of undergraduate degree programme.

Standard Operating Procedures

Entry and Exit options for Students of 4-year UG Degree Programme with Honours:

Entry 1: 1st year (1st Sem.) :

- The entry requirement for the 1st year of 4-year UG Degree is Intermediate/12th class of PSEB/CBSE/ or any other equivalent certificate and as per the eligibility conditions as specified in the Ordinances related to respective stream/ programme.

Entry 2: 4th year (7th Sem.):

- A student who has completed a three-year degree program with three discipline specific subjects (majors) may enter in the 4th year (VIIth Sem) of Honours programme in any one of the three discipline specific subjects (major) studied in the first three years of the UG Degree Programme.

Note: Students who complete the first three years in a college shall be automatically promoted to the 4th year within the same college, without any new admissions provided the student must fulfil all eligibility and promotion criteria as stipulated in CBGS Ordinances.

Exit 1: After 3-years (6th Sem.):

- Students must pass all courses/papers in Semesters 1 to 6 if they wish to exit after three years with a normal UG Degree.
- A Bachelor's Degree is to be awarded if students exit after successful completion of 3-year of study.

Exit 2: After 4-years (8th Sem.):

- A Bachelor's Degree with Honours is to be awarded if students exit after successful completion of 4-years of study.

Grading System

The Grading will follow Credit-Based System, the details of which are given below:

While undertaking the course work, the following terms are defined:

'Course' means a paper.

'Credit' means weightage assigned to a course

'Grade' means a letter grade assigned to a student on a 10 point scale.

'Grade point' means points assigned to a letter grade.

'Semester Grade Point Average' (SGPA) means weighted average of grades in a semester

$$SGPA = \frac{\sum_{i=1}^m (G_i \times C_i)}{\sum_{i=1}^m C_i}$$

Where G_i are the grade points obtained by a student in the i th registered course and C_i are the credits of the i th registered course and 'm' is the number of courses registered by a student in a particular semester.

$$\sum_{i=1}^m (G_i \times C_i) = \text{Total grade points obtained by a student in a semester,}$$

$$\sum_{i=1}^m C_i = \text{Total credits registered by the student in that semester.}$$

Or

$$SGPA = \frac{[(G_1 \times C_1) + (G_2 \times C_2) + \dots + (G_m \times C_m)]}{[C_1 + C_2 + \dots + C_m]}$$

‘Cumulative Grade Point Average’ (CGPA) means weighted average of grades in all the semesters computed at the end of any semester or at the end of the course completion.

$$CGPA = \frac{\sum_{i=1}^n (G_i \times C_i)}{\sum_{i=1}^n C_i}$$

$$= \frac{[(G_1 \times C_1) + (G_2 \times C_2) + \dots + (G_n \times C_n)]}{[C_1 + C_2 + \dots + C_n]},$$

where G_i are the grade points obtained by a student in the i th registered course and C_i are the credits of the i th registered course, ‘ n ’ is the number of courses registered in all the semesters.

SGPA and CGPA shall be calculated up to two decimal places, after rounding off the third decimal to the nearest second place integer decimal, hence 0.005 to be increased to 0.01

The student would be awarded a letter grade on a 10 point scale on the basis of his/her performance. Grades shall be awarded as per the following table:

Minimum Credits and Minimum CGPA required for a degree

The credits for the courses in which a student has obtained 'P' (minimum passing grade for a course) grade or higher shall be counted as Credits earned by him/her. A student shall have to earn a minimum of such number of Credits as may be required for the award of a degree in a particular course/discipline. A student, who has obtained a minimum CGPA of 4 and earned a minimum number of Credits as per scheme as specified for the programme, shall be eligible for the award of the respective degree.

- A student shall be required to maintain a minimum of 4 CGPA at the end of the final semester of his/her degree programme. If his/her CGPA falls below 4 at the end of final semester, the student will be declared as having failed in that particular year and will have to seek readmission in the odd semester of the particular year. For Example: In three year UG programme, the candidate having failed in the (final) 6th semester will have to seek readmission in the 5th semester.
- A student getting 'F' grade in any course will be treated as having failed in that course. If he/she fails in a course, he/she will have to repeat the course and will have to obtain at least 'P' grade in that course within the maximum specified period to complete the degree for that programme.

A student who does not complete the programme of study within the minimum duration of the course of his/her study, or gets 'F' grade in any course shall not be eligible for any merit position/medal/award of the University.

Notes:

1. All such students who were admitted under the non-credit based system before the implementation of credit based evaluation and grading system will be governed under the prevalent respective Ordinances of non-credit based system of examination till, they pass such classes/courses.
2. Clauses relating to medium of instructions, duration of courses, eligibility, re-appear etc. which have not been mentioned under the new Common Ordinances will remain the same as per their previous ordinances.

University Examination Rules

- A student may not be permitted to appear in House Exams /University Exams if he/she fails to deposit fee in time.
- Every student must be present in all house examinations. Absent students will be penalized Rs.100/- per subject/paper, subject to maximum of Rs.500/-.
- Every student has to get at least 25% marks in aggregate in the House Exams.
- A student must attend at least 75% lectures in every subject.
- If a student does not fulfill the above criteria, he/she may not be allowed to appear in university examination

Code of Conduct

- Writing and sticking bills on the walls of college is prohibited.
- No outsider is permitted to meet the students without the permission of the principal.
- Mobile phones are not permitted in the college premises. Students will be fined in such cases.
- Any student found guilty of taking intoxicants/drugs in the college campus may be suspended immediately.
- Any damage to the college property will be severely penalized. Such students will not be allowed to continue their studies.
- Students who bring their vehicles with altered silencers that create noise pollution will be fined Rs.1000.
- Students are directed not to visit multipurpose hall and open air theatre in ordinary days. Any violator will be fined Rs. 500.
- Students are strictly prohibited to bring any kind of weapons in the college campus.
- Strict disciplinary action will be taken against careless and undisciplined students.
- Students must read instructions on the college notice board daily.
- Students must listen carefully to the instructions given during assembly and follow them earnestly.
- Routes of the buses will be decided by the college transport committee and students should follow the same.
- Routes of buses may be changed from time to time.

Prohibition, Prevention and Punishment for Ragging

Students are directed to desist any kind of ragging. Various forms of ragging include: Display of noisy, disorderly conduct, teasing, excitement by rough or rude treatment or handling, undisciplined activities which cause or are likely to cause annoyance, undue hardship, physical or psychological harm or raise apprehensive fear in a fresher, asking the students to do any act or perform which such a student will not do in the ordinary course and which causes him/her shame or embarrassment or danger to his/her life etc.

Punishment for Participation in /or Abetment of Ragging:

- Cancellation of admission.
- Suspension from attending classes.
- Withholding/withdrawing scholarship/fellowship and other benefits.
- Debarring from appearing in any test/examination or other educational process or withholding result.
- Rustication from the institution for period varying from six months to two years.
- Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution.
- Fine ranging between Rs. 25000 to Rs. 1,00,000.

Rules for Identity Card & Library

- Students should contact library immediately after admission for identity card.
- It will be necessary for every student to get the identity card issued in the scheduled time period. The students are required to bring their identity cards while in college and present the same, if asked for.
- Library remains open from 9.00am to 4.00pm throughout the session except on Sundays and other holidays.
- Students should deposit their personal belongings at the entrance before entering the library.
- Students are strictly prohibited to take cuttings from library books, newspapers and magazines.
- Books will be issued for 14 days and must be returned and get reissued, if needed. Fine of Re.1 per day will be charged for overdue books.
- Any student, who loses, defaces or otherwise damages any book shall have to pay the cost of the book as per library rules.
- Books should be carefully checked before getting issued.
- Number of books which can be borrowed at a time from library is:
 - Undergraduate classes: Three books.
 - Post Graduate classes: Six books.
- Library books should be returned in the library at the end of the session for clearance of account.
- Loss of ticket should be reported to the librarian. A fine of Rs10 per ticket will be charged for the loss of ticket. Failure in reporting the loss of ticket, student will have to pay for the books if those are issued on lost tickets.
- Students are expected to maintain discipline and silence in the library and reading hall.
- The loss of identity card should be reported immediately and an FIR should be registered.
- Fine of Rs100 will be charged in case of loss of identity card. It is the responsibility of the student to get duplicate card issued immediately.
- Reference books and magazines will not be issued to the students.
- Text books will be issued for full academic session to the poor and deserving students from book-bank.

Rules for Taking Leave

- Leave should be applied by the student personally or by the parents/guardian on the prescribed form available in the office with the required documents.
- In case of serious illness the leave application must be submitted as soon as possible along with medical certificate. However, approval of leave does not provide relaxation in the university condition of minimum lectures.
- If a student is absent continuously for ten days from a class without sanction of leave, his/her name may be struck off from college rolls. Re-admission may be allowed only on request of parents.
- A fine of Rs.5 /- per lecture will be charged for remaining absent from the class.

Financial Assistance

With a view to help the economically weak and meritorious students, the college provides many scholarships and free-ships. These include academic, sports and cultural scholarships. There is a provision of free education to physically challenged students. The financial assistance shall be provided to deserving and eligible students as per College/University/Government rules; the same shall be displayed on the notice board of the college. Those who wish to avail this facility shall have to apply in time as per notice displayed. The list of government scholarships/ fee concessions available is as following:

- Govt. of India/State Govt. Merit Scholarship.
- Scheme of Post Matric Scholarship for students belonging to S.C./S.T., O.B.C and Minorities
- Scheme of merit-cum-means-scholarship for students belonging to the minority communities.
- Any other financial scheme announced by the Govt. will be applicable for college students.
- Fee concession to the wards of university employees shall be given as per ordinances of Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar.

Fee Rules

- University Examination fees will be charged semester wise and as notified by the college from time to time.
- Migration fees will be charged at the time of admission from the concerned students as per university rules.
- Bus fees and Practical fees will be charged from the concerned students only.
- It will be responsibility of the student/parents to deposit the fees in time.
- Late fee fine is decided by the university and dates are notified from time to time.
- Students seeking late admission will not have any concession in late fee.
- Fees once deposited will be refunded under university rules only.
- If a student leaves the college in the middle of the session, he/she is required to inform the college office. Failing this he/she will have to deposit all dues along with fine in order to claim any certificate from the college.
- Half tuition fee will be remitted to the junior most of two or more siblings.
- Students who leave the college can get the refund of their security by 30th November in the following session, subject to the condition that all their dues are cleared. If not claimed in time, security will be lapsed. Students will have to produce original receipt of their fee of entry year in the college to claim the security.
- Financial assistance to Scheduled Caste students will be provided as per Punjab government scheme of Post Ma–tric Scholarship. Scholarship will be paid to the students whose parents/guardians' income from all sources is not more than Rs. 2,50,000/- (Rs. Two lakhs and fifty thousand only) per annum.

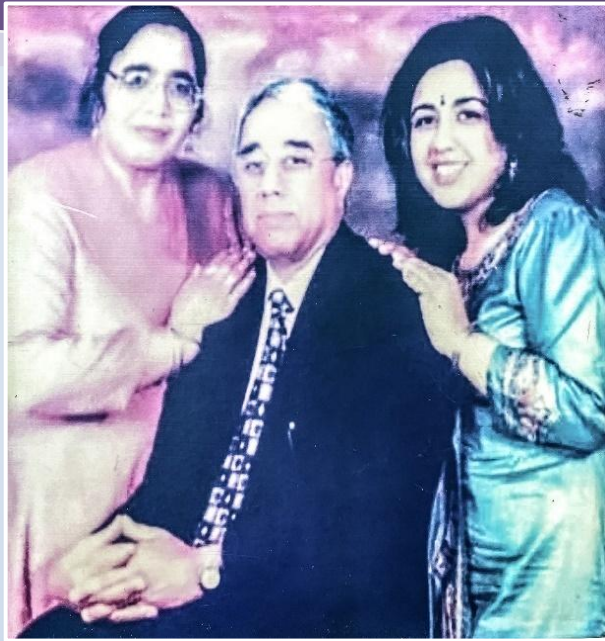
